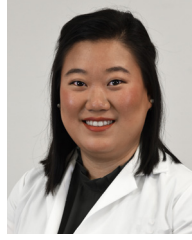

In its first 100 years, Cleveland Clinic has introduced many medical firsts, opened facilities around the world and is proud to be ranked among the top hospitals in the country.

Union Hospital, which celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2006, became a part of the Cleveland Clinic as a regional hospital in 2018. Patients of Union Hospital now have access to care and providers in the Cleveland Clinic network.

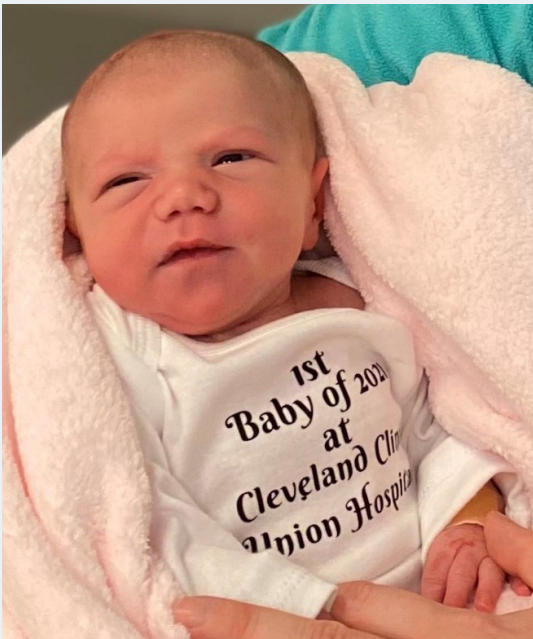

When was your last Pap smear?

This is one of the most common questions I ask my patients. Sometimes, the answer comes easily: "Last year," some patients will say.

For others, it takes some head scratching to remember when it was. The conclusion might be "several years ago" or "during my last pregnancy" ... and that baby is now 20 years old.

The Pap smear should be performed starting at age 21 for most healthy women. Adolescents should establish with a gynecologist before this age to discuss birth control, menstrual cycles and sexual activity.

Let's establish some background information.

When you come to the gynecologist, we perform a pelvic exam. The Pap smear is a screening test we may perform during that pelvic exam, where we sweep some cells off the cervix and send them for testing.

Sounds painful right? Let's be honest, it's not comfortable; however, it gives more of a cramping sensation than sharp pain. These cervical cells are then analyzed for abnormalities like pre-cancer or cancer.

Depending on your age, we may also test for human papilloma virus (HPV) with the Pap smear. There are high-risk strains of this virus that we know cause pre-cancer of the cervix.

All in all, the goal of this testing is to pick up pre-cancerous lesions early, before they become cancer. Because of that, In the United States the Pap smear has done wonders for decreasing the number of cervical cancer cases.

According to the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology (ACOG), "the incidence of cervical cancer in the United States has decreased 50 percent in the past 30 years because of widespread screening ... mortality from the disease has undergone a similar decrease." In other words, we cut the number of cases in half and fewer people are dying from it.

While this is all great news, we can do better. If you're reading this wondering when your last Pap smear was, or you have a Mom, sister, daughter, aunt, or friend who hasn't seen a gynecologist in quite some time or ever: it's time.

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month



The month of March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month.

In 20 years, it has grown to be a rallying point for the colorectal cancer community where thousands of patients, survivors, caregivers and advocates throughout the country join together to spread colorectal cancer awareness by wearing blue, holding fund-raising and education events, talking to friends and family about screening and so much more.

Colorectal cancer is the number two cause of cancer deaths in the United States – even though it's one of the most preventable and treatable forms of cancer, if caught early.

Up to 85% of colorectal cancers could be prevented or successfully treated if everyone who is eligible for a colonoscopy got screened.

A colonoscopy is the gold standard in screening because it can both detect and remove polyps before they can turn into colon cancer – the second leading cause of cancer death among men and women in the United States.

Cleveland Clinic Union Hospital's surgery facilities – the hospital's Surgery Center and the off-site Tuscarawas Ambulatory Surgery Center – are available for colonoscopies and safe for patient care from the spread of COVID-19. If you have been referred for or are considering talking with your doctor about a colonoscopy, don't delay this important part of your overall healthcare.

Have more questions? Talk to your primary care provider, a gastroenterologist or a general surgeon. Both gastroenterologists and general surgeons perform colonoscopies

Virtual visits provide care options amid pandemic

Despite the challenges presented by the current coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak, our Cleveland Clinic Union Hospital provider offices (also known as “Union Physician Services” or “UPS”) are always here for you — making sure you have a way to schedule virtual follow-up visits with your healthcare providers.

Virtual visits can help you save valuable time by letting you receive care from your healthcare team using your mobile device or computer. If you receive a prescription at the end of your virtual visit, it can be sent directly to your local pharmacy that is most convenient for you.

Many providers offer a variety of virtual scheduled visits, including regular follow-up, pre and post-op, pre and post natal check-in, triage visits, pre-visit information sessions, medication review, genetic counseling, infectious disease visits prior to travelling, etc.

Most scheduled virtual visits are currently offered by our providers through the secure MyChart platform. Should your provider offer a different option, you will receive detailed information and instructions regarding your upcoming virtual visit.

Most insurance companies are paying for virtual visits for COVID-19 positive diagnoses; for these, our providers will waive financial responsibility you may have.

For services for non-COVID-19 positive diagnoses, some insurance companies are paying for virtual visits; for these, we will only bill you for your financial responsibility after we have billed your insurance. Insurance companies are beginning to change their coverage of virtual visits for non-COVID-19-related symptoms, so it is best to confirm your benefits with your insurance company prior to care. Virtual visits are still an option for you, even if your insurance company does not cover it.
